FRAMING THE WEEK

Congress remains at a stalemate over approving additional COVID-19 aid after Senate Democrats and Republicans blocked each other proposals last Thursday. However, pressure is mounting for Congress to act, as funding for **Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans** for small businesses dwindles and the unemployment rate climbs. According to Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin, \$90 billion in PPP loan applications have been approved and another \$100 billion are being processed, leaving a balance of about \$160 billion.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) is seeking a "clean PPP funding increase" of \$250 billion, while House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) are calling for a more expansive interim emergency coronavirus package – including, \$250 billion in small business assistance (as well as PPP changes), \$100 billion for the **Provider Relief Fund**, \$150 billion for state and local governments via the **Coronavirus Relief Fund**, and a 15 percent increase to the maximum **SNAP benefit**. Democratic leaders are also demanding additional funding for production and distribution of **national rapid testing and personal protective equipment (PPE)**, as well as public reporting of demographic information of patients with COVID-19. Senate Democrats are focused on negotiating with Secretary Mnuchin in hopes that securing President Trump's endorsement will pressure Sente Republicans to support the more expansive package.

Leader McConnell has <u>said</u> that he is "in favor of even more funding for hospitals and providers down the line" but "need[s] to see the existing funding begin to work before we can know what additional resources may be needed."

Last Friday, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) <u>released</u> details on how the **first \$30 billion of the \$100 billion <u>Provider Relief Fund</u>**, created by Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act (<u>H.R. 748</u>), will be allocated and disseminated. Facilities and providers that received Medicare fee-for-service (FFS) reimbursements in 2019 are eligible for the rapid distribution.

While the Trump administration's plan for the remaining \$70 billion is not yet available, HHS noted it is working to develop targeted distributions that will focus on: (1) providers in areas particularly impacted by the COVID-19 outbreak; (2) rural providers; (3) providers who deliver services with lower shares of Medicare reimbursement or who predominantly serve the Medicaid population; and (4) providers requesting reimbursement for the treatment of uninsured Americans. HHS reiterated the administration's position that a portion of the \$100 billion will be used to reimburse health care providers, at Medicare rates, for **COVID-related treatment of the uninsured**. Of note, providers must abstain from **balance billing** any patient for COVID-19 related treatment as a condition of receiving funds from the Provider Relief Fund.

On a related note, Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee Chairman Lamar Alexander (R-TN) and House Energy and Commerce (E&C) Committee Ranking Member Greg Walden

(R-OR) are calling for the next COVID-19 relief package to contain a measure to protect patients from **surprise medical bills**, including bills unrelated to COVID-19. Along with E&C Committee Chairman Frank Pallone, Jr. (D-NJ), they support resolving payment disputes using benchmark payments set at the median contracted rate and allowing independent dispute resolution (i.e., arbitration) for services for which the median contracted rate is greater than \$750 in 2022. Democrats have not yet indicated whether they support including surprise medical billing provisions in a COVID-19 package or prefer to address the issue in an end-of-year package reauthorizing health care extenders, which expire on November 30, 2020.

As for the timing of more comprehensive legislation on COVID-19, floor action remains unclear and complicated. Lawmakers are scheduled to return to Washington next week, but the House Rules Committee is pursuing **alternatives to in-person voting**, such as remote voting or proxy voting – both of which would require a rule change. While the House and Senate are out of session, legislation can only be passed by a voice vote or unanimous consent.

Thurs. (4/9)

• **The Senate** failed to pass a measure (by unanimous consent) to provide additional COVID-19 relief, as each party rejected the other's proposal. <u>Details</u>.

Wed. (4/8)

- Sens. Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) and Bill Cassidy (R-LA) <u>led</u> a bipartisan <u>letter</u> to HHS Secretary Alex Azar and CMS Administrator Seema Verma, calling for more flexibility on interest rates and repayment of Medicare's accelerated advance payments. <u>Details</u>.
- Senate Finance Chairman and Ranking Member Chuck Grassley (R-IA) and Ron Wyden (D-OR), House Ways and Means Chairman and Ranking Member Richard Neal (D-MA) and Kevin Brady (R-TX), and Sen. - **HHS** issued a <u>press release</u> detailing how the first \$30 billion of the \$100 billion Provider Relief Fund created by the CARES Act will be allocated and disseminated. <u>Details</u>.
- **AHRQ** announced a forecasted funding opportunity focused on the telehealth expansion and the role of primary care during the COVID-19 pandemic. The opportunity is open to broad eligibility. Details.

Thurs. (4/9)

- **FDA** <u>issued</u> guidance to provide recommendations to health care providers and investigators on the administration and study of investigational convalescent plasma collected from individuals who have recovered from COVID-19. The guidance also details recommendations for the collection of COVID-19 convalescent plasma collections, including donor eligibility and labeling requirements. <u>Details</u>.
- CMS announced that hospital-specific reports (HSRs), will be available for review no later than Friday, April 10 via QualityNet, for the fiscal year (FY) 2021 Hospital Value-Based Purchasing (VBP) Program. The review and correction period begins Monday, April 13, 2020 and hospitals must submit requests for CMS' consideration by Tuesday, May 12, 2020. Details.
- **NIH** <u>announced</u> the launch of a clinical trial for hydroxychloroquine as a potential therapy for COVID-19. The clinical trial will evaluate the safety and effectiveness of hydroxychloroquine for the treatment of adults hospitalized with COVID-19. <u>Details</u>.
- The Treasury Department and Federal Reserve, along with other federal agencies, took several steps to provide economic relief to small and medium-sized businesses, households, and states and local governments affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. <u>Details</u>.
- DEA announced it is adjusting the 2020 aggregate production quotas for certain schedule II controlled substances and the assessment of annual needs for list I chemical ephedrine and pseudoephedrine. <u>Details</u>.
- **HRSA** awarded 1,387 health centers across the country a collective \$1.32 billion in funding through the CARES Act. A list of award recipients and funding amounts is available here by state. Details.
- **FEMA** <u>issued</u> a temporary final rule to distribute certain scarce personal protective equipment (PPE) for domestic use, so that these materials may not be exported from the U.S. unless exempted or with the explicit approval of FEMA. Details.

Wed. (4/8)

- OASH <u>announced</u> it is extending the comment period for the public to provide feedback on recommendations for maintaining an adequate national blood supply. Responses are now due on June 21, 2020. Details.
- **CMS** announced that it is delaying launch and implementation of the Innovation Centers' Emergency Triage, Treat, and Transport (ET3) model to the Fall of 2020. The model was originally slated to begin on May 1, 2020. <u>Details</u>.
- FCC <u>posted</u> a public inspection version of its Report and Order formally adopting the COVID-19 Telehealth Program. The program will distribute \$200 million in funding (as appropriated by the CARES Act) to providers seeking to establish telehealth systems for treating COVID-19 patients. Details.

• **HHS OIG** <u>released</u> the results of a "pulse survey" conducted with hospital administrators between March 23 and March 27, 2020. The survey was designed to provide decision makers at every level of government with a national snapshot of hospitals' challenges and needs in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic. Details.

• ACL posted a grant opportunity for state governments to apply to receive additional funding for their Aging and Disability Resource Centers' (ADRCs) response to the COVID-19 pandemic through the No Wrong Door System. Applications are due April 15. <u>Details</u>.

- **CMS** released the final Calendar Year (CY) 2021 Medicare Advantage and Part D Rate Announcement (fact sheet). Details.

- **FNS** recently <u>launched</u> the "<u>Meals for Kids</u>" <u>Site Finder</u> an online tool to help families find meals for children while schools are closed during the COVID-19 pandemic. <u>Details</u>.

- **Apr. 14:** OMB released a solicitation for comments on questions posed by the Interagency Technical Working Group on Evaluating Alternative Measures of Poverty regarding the development of additional measures for poverty, beyond the current Official Poverty Measure (OPM) and Supplemental Poverty Measure (SPM). - **Apr. 15:** FDA <u>issued</u> a request for information (RFI) related to the use of vaping products that are associated with lung injuries, to gather information from the public that could help identify and evaluate additional steps the agency could take to address the recent surge in lung injuries associated with e-cigarettes and vaping. Details.
- **Apr. 18:** CMS released a proposed rule that establishes Civil Monetary Penalties (CMPs) for group and non-group health plans that do not fulfill their Medicare Secondary Payer reporting obligations. Details.
- **Apr. 20:** CMS published a <u>notice of proposed rulemaking</u> (NPRM) that would revise and modernize requirements for Preadmission Screening and Resident Review (PASRR) in Medicaid-certified nursing facilities (NFs). <u>Details</u>.
- **Apr. 22:** USDA issued two new proposed rules that will roll back certain Obama-era requirements in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), the School Breakfast Program (SBP) and the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP). <u>Details</u>.
