- Phase 1 Bill – Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020 ([H.R. 6074](#))<sup>1</sup>
- Phase 2 Bill – Families First Coronavirus Response Act ([H.R. 6201](#))<sup>2</sup>
- Phase 3 Bill – Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act ([H.R. 748](#))<sup>3</sup>
- Phase 3.5 Bill – Phase 3.5 Bill – Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act ([H.R. 266](#))<sup>4</sup>
