Framing the Week

Congress returns this week after a week and a half off for the Thanksgiving holiday. The Senate returns on Monday evening and the House comes into session on Tuesday afternoon. Prior to leaving town for the holiday Congress passed a Continuing Resolution (CR) to keep the government in operation until January 19 (for the Agriculture, Military Construction and Veterans Affairs, Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and the Energy and Water appropriations bills) and until February 2 for the remaining 8 bills. The CR was passed due to broad Democratic support and was "clean" with no steep spending cuts or controversial policy riders. The CR further included an extension until January 19, for key health programs that would have otherwise expired on November 19, including community health centers, the National Health Service Corps, teaching health centers and graduate medical education programs. The stopgap measure also includes a delay of the Medicaid disproportionate share hospital (DSH) pay cuts until January 19, a temporary extension of the Special Diabetes Program for Type I Diabetes and Special Diabetes Program for Indians, and portions of the Pandemic and All-Hazards Preparedness Act. The bill further includes an extension for programs covered under the Farm Bill until September 20, 2025.

House Freedom Caucus Members were very much in opposition to the CR and have pledged to not support any spending measure that does not contain drastic spending cuts. So far, the House has been unable to pass the Labor-HHS, CJS, Transportation-HUD, Financial Services, or Agriculture bills due to a deep divide within the Republican party. Needless to say, while there may be a reprieve for a short time, finding consensus on a final spending package remains a major challenge.

In the meantime, there are several other bills for Congress to focus on. In a <u>letter</u> to Senate Democrats, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer outlined the work that needs to be done over the next month including "national security supplemental funding, NDAA reauthorization, and military promotions, among others." Senator Schumer states he plans to bring the emergency supplemental to the floor for a vote as soon as the week of December 4th though no agreement has been reached on the border security provisions that Republicans insist be included. The health committees of jurisdiction are also expected to use the month of December to try and negotiate a healthcare package that could include legislation focused on increased transparency, prescription drug affordability, provider payment reform, and bolstering the health care workforce. An early 2024 omnibus still seems like the most likely legislative vehicle to move such a package, but with this Congress everything is fluid.

Regulatory Update

The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has not cleared any new rules. An array of rules are under review.

Medicare, Medicaid, or Both:

- CMS Enforcement of State Compliance with Medicaid Reporting and Renewal Requirements
 –The interim final rule would establish rules regarding CMS enforcement of states' compliance
 with reporting requirements and renewal requirements during the period that begins on July 1,
 2023 and ends on June 30, 2024. The interim final rule may codify existing guidance and
 provide more details on how CMS may enforce the requirements. The interim final rule was not
 included in the Spring 2023 Unified Agenda.
- Appeals Process The <u>propose rule</u>, pursuant to a court order, would establish new appeals
 processes for Medicare beneficiaries who have an inpatient hospital admission changed to
 outpatient by a hospital.
- Healthcare System Resiliency and Modernization The <u>proposed rule</u> would establish culturally competent and person-centered requirements for all provider and supplier types that participate in Medicare and Medicaid programs.

Other Topics:

- Conscience Rights in Health Care The <u>final rule</u> would safeguard the rights of federal conscience and religious nondiscrimination while protecting access to care, including abortion.
- Health Data Interoperability The <u>final rule</u> would implement certain provisions of the 21st
 Century Cures Act and make several enhancements to the ONC Health IT Certification Program
 to advance interoperability, improve transparency, and support the access, exchange, and use of
 electronic health information.

GAO Report

The Government Accountability Office (GAO) released a report on interagency collaboration and the Dietary Guidelines for Americans (DGA) which provide science-based advice on what to eat and drink to promote health, reduce chronic disease, and meet nutrient needs. The Departments of Agriculture (USDA) and Health and Human Services (HHS) co-chair a committee to identify research priorities that will inform the 2025-2030 guidelines. GAO developed this report to describe how federal agencies promote the 2020-2025 DGA, and examine HHS and USDA efforts to collaborate to identify and prioritize research that may inform future editions.

- Findings: GAO found that agencies including HHS, USDA, the Department of Defense (DoD), and the Veterans' Administration (VA) are taking action to promote the DGA as required by statute. GAO says that these actions include web-based resources, incorporating the DGA into USDA and other nutrition programs, nutrition labeling, technical assistance, and partnerships with stakeholders. HHS and USDA also use internal processes and interagency collaboration to identify and prioritize human nutrition research, but have not fully incorporated leading collaboration practices. GAO has previously identified eight leading interagency collaboration practices:
 - Define common outcomes;
 - Ensure accountability;
 - o Bridge organizational cultures;
 - Identify and sustain leadership;
 - Clarify roles and responsibilities;
 - Include relevant participants;
 - o Leverage resources and information; and
 - Develop and update written guidance and agreements.

GAO found that of these practices, HHS and USDA's Interagency Committee on Human Nutrition Research (ICNHR) has fully implemented "identify and sustain leadership" but has only partially implemented the other seven practices.

• Conclusion: GAO concludes that the ICHNR has been successful at serving as a forum for sharing interagency research priorities and coordination research, but should more fully incorporate leading practices for interagency collaboration and accountability. GAO says that fully incorporating the practices could help inform and prioritize research, make recommendations for future DGA editions, and reduce fragmented or duplicative research efforts. The agencies said that a challenge is the lack of funding for key activities like completing additional studies and creating a tool to track federal human nutrition research.
